James Reinders, President

James Reinders is a life member of both the ANA and PNNA, and serves as PNNA Scout Program coordinator and was the Scout chair for the 2015 ANA National Money Show committee (Portland Oregon, March 5-7, 2015). He received the PNNA 2009 Everett Award, is webmaster for the Willamette Coin club, received the ANA 2013 Adult Advisor Award and serves as the chair of the Technology Advisory Committee for the ANA. James has won acclaim for the scout workshops he has run over the past decade that have helped more than 900 scouts earn coin collecting badges.
