# ENCASED CENTS OF WASHINGTON STATE

The first encased cents in the United States were issued in 1901. They were popular right away and there were some issues in this State in 1901. The date on the coin encased is usually the year of issue since most of the time only uncirculated coins are used. So dates are mentioned here. Most pieces are round. The diameters are listed. Odd-shape pieces exist usually in the form of a horse shoe or a chamberpot. Pieces holed for key chain are noted.
