# **NCW Program Continued**

The PNNA board voted to continue the award program for club efforts to publicize National Coin Week. The NCW theme for 1999 is "Treasure from Change," and is intended to emphasize the changes in circulating coinage that will be obvious this year as the 50-states quarters start to be released.

The awards are \$100-\$75-\$50 for the top three club efforts. The annual theme does not have to be part of your effort; if you have an already-established program for promoting coin collecting in your community that does not refer directly to the annual NCW theme, it is still acceptable for consideration. Send a report of your club's efforts to Larry Rowe at PO Box 61621, Vancouver, WA 98666 not later than 31 May.

#### **Exhibits at the PNNA Convention**

Exhibits must be in place by noon on Saturday 3 April to be eligible for awards, which will be announced at 4:00 PM. We would prefer to have your exhibits in place on Friday, so that visitors to the convention can view and learn from them. If you want to use PNNA cases, you must send an application to Larry Rowe by 25 March so that those cases can be available. Use the form in the last *Nor'wester* to apply for exhibit space and exhibit cases (send to Larry Rowe, PO Box 61621, Vancouver, WA 98666; phone 360-573-9827; email medalman@paclink.com). Remember that the PNNA best of show winner receives \$200 in assistance to take the winning exhibit to the ANA anniversary convention in Chicago in August.

The complete exhibit application is four pages long, just like ANA's. Pages 2-4 are only needed if you intend to have someone else place or remove your exhibit or if you are a multiple winner of first place awards at previous PNNA conventions. If you think you need the last three pages, ask for a complete copy of the rules from the secretary at the address in the letterhead. There are several references to specific parts of the rules in the application; if you have a copy of the ANA rules, you can determine what those references are without having the PNNA rules in hand.

#### **Bob Everett Memorial Award**

The first recipient of the Bob Everett Memorial Award will be selected by the awards committee and announced at the PNNA general membership meeting at the convention on Saturday, April 3. The monetary value of the award will also be announced at that time.

#### New Exhibit Added To ANA Web Site

One man's attempt, nearly a century ago, to revive the silver mining industry is retold in the newest exhibit mounted on the ANA's World Wide Web site (www.money.org). Joseph Lesher was a miner in Colorado who privately produced octagonal medals between 1900 and 1901 for use by businesses in Colorado. Lesher lived in Victor, a gold mining community near the town of Cripple Creek. He called the silver pieces "referendum dollars" so no one would have to accept them against their will. However, he hoped their use would create a demand to reopen the silver mines, most of which had closed after the government stopped buying the precious metal in 1873.

The virtual exhibit on the ANA's Web site shows Lesher medals from private collections, including many pieces from Adna G. Wilde Jr., considered the foremost expert on Lesher dollars. The text for the exhibit is a recently updated version of a feature article Wilde originally wrote for The Numismatist in November 1978.

# Minutes of PNNA board meeting — 16 January 1999, Kent, WA

The meeting was called to order by President Tom Sheehan at 5:04 PM. Present were vice presidents Larry Gaye and Bill McKivor, secretary/treasurer Joe Boling, past president Eric Holcomb, directors Richard Billings, Del Cushing, Marge Farnam, Paul Longcrier, Scott Loos, Alex Pancheco, Larry Rowe, and Bruce Wonder, and members Don Farnam and Helen Young.

Moved (Rowe) and seconded (Cushing) to approve the minutes of the 21 November board meeting as published. Passed.

Boling distributed the yearend financial report [PNNA members may request a copy from the treasurer].

President Sheehan is still working on the appointment of a dealer-director.

Larry Gaye and Larry Rowe described some of their ideas for the PNNA exhibit at the "Seeing Money" art show. At this time the PNNA's involvement in addition to the exhibit has not been defined.

The Bob Everett award committee has received no nominations, although the committee members have some ides of their own.

Boling reported that several people during the current dues renewal season have commented on the PNNA dues being too low. Moved (Gaye) and seconded (Rowe) to increase the PNNA dues beginning in January 2000 to: individual \$10, family/club \$15, life \$200. Passed.

Moved (Rowe) and seconded (Billings) to nominate Bill Horton and Arthur M. Fitts III for ANA governor and Bob Campbell for ANA president. Passed.

Moved (Farnam) and seconded (Pancheco) to award honorary life membership to Eric Holcomb in light of his service for two terms as PNNA president. Passed. [HLM25]

Moved (Farnam) and seconded (Holcomb) to award honorary life membership to Joe Boling in light of his five years' service as secretary and three years' service as treasurer. Passed. [HLM26]

Tom Sheehan suggested that the PNNA make a donation to the ANA/ANS counterfeit symposium to be held in Seattle in March. After some discussion, no motion was made nor further action taken.

Moved (Farnam) and seconded (McKivor) to appoint Ashley Mearns as PNNA young numismatist (YN) coordinator, with duties to be defined by herself and the PNNA board. Passed.

The meeting was adjourned at 5:50 PM.

New ANA Regional Coordinator — Scott Loos of Spokane, Washington, has been named the ANA regional coordinator for Region 7, which comprises Alaska, Idaho, Oregon and Washington. ANA President Anthony Swiatek made the appointment on the recommendation of Walt Ostromecki, national coordinator for the ANA's Representative Program. "Scott, who served as an ANA district delegate for five years, is enthusiastic about his new appointment and brings a wealth of talent to his new job," Swiatek says.

An accountant and part-time coin dealer, Loos says, "I am committed to expanding the collector base through numismatic education and young numismatist development. These are my goals for the region, our hobby and the ANA Representative Program."

A life member of the ANA, Loos has served as past president, secretary and treasurer of the Inland Empire Coin Club in Spokane; and two terms as director of the Pacific Northwest Numismatic Association. He also is an ANA certified exhibit judge.

Loos replaces Tom Sheehan, who "did a fine job of building hobby fellowship and opening communication lines between the ANA staff and members in Region 7 for nearly 10 years," Ostromecki says.

Sheehan says, "I think it is time to relinquish my post as regional coordinator. My interest in numismatic has not waned nor has my devotion to the ANA, however, I decided to actually spend more time with coins and medals. I also want to try my hand at dealing in coins and promoting modern medallic art."

1999 NCW Theme: "Treasures in Change" — The 50 States circulating commemorative quarter program is helping the ANA celebrate the 76th National Coin Week, April 18-24, 1999. "The launching of the commemorative quarter program by the United States Mint offers a wonderful opportunity to focus attention on *Treasures in Change*, the theme for the 1999 National Coin Week," says ANA Education Director Gail Baker Kraljevich. "National Coin Week offers a special time to educate the public about the hobby of numismatics, where everyone can hold history in their hands."

**Register Early for Summer Seminar** — Students should register early for the 30 classes being offered at the ANA's 31st Annual Summer Seminar, scheduled for July 10-16, 1999, at the ANA on The Colorado College campus in Colorado Springs, Colorado.

The popularity of the week-long conference remains strong, so again the ANA is capping enrollment at 300 and limiting some classes. This attendance limit will help maintain the program's integrity, according to ANA

Education Department Director Gail Baker Kraljevich.

The 1999 feast of Summer Conference courses, including 5 new offerings, will be served up by experts in their fields, allowing students to benefit from the experience of some of the best-known names in the hobby. Among the new classes are two based on Colorado themes: "Numismatic Treasures of Colorado" with Ed Rochette, an expert on Colorado lore, and Don Kagin, an authority on Territorial gold, and "Exploring Colorado's Ghost Towns" with Mark Hotz. Also featured is "Preparing a Competitive Exhibit" with awarding-winning exhibitors Gerald L. Kochel, John Eshbach and Joe Boling, who also is the ANA's chief judge.

ANA Initiates "Circle of Friends" Oral History Project — Chester L. "Chet" Krause, founder of Krause Publications, is the first interviewee invited to participate in the ANA Library's oral history project, "Circle of Friends."

"Oral histories are one way of preserving the history of the hobby," ANA Librarian Nawana Britenriker said. "Accordingly, the Library has initiated this extensive project. "The recent visit of Chet Krause at ANA headquarters in Colorado Springs (Colorado) gave us the perfect opportunity to begin the program at this time." Audio tapes of these conversations will be available to ANA members through the Library's normal circulation policy (members pay only postage and insurance for use of the tapes). They also will be added to the ANA's web site (www.money.org).

ANA Candidate Forum at Sacramento Town Hall Meeting — Candidates for the ANA Board of Governors will participate in a question-and-answer forum at the ANA's 1999 National Money Show in Sacramento, California, March 12-14. Each of the candidates at the forum will be given an opportunity to make an opening statement before questions are accepted from the hobby press and the floor. ANA members eligible to vote will receive their ballots by mail in June.

ANA Launches New Intern Program — The ANA has launched a new Intern Program that will allow two numismatic enthusiasts an opportunity to work approximately 10 weeks this summer at Association headquarters on the campus of The Colorado College in Colorado Springs, Colorado. Beginning June 5, 1999, interns will have an opportunity to assist with many programs and activities at the ANA. These may include collection management activities in the Library and Museum; organizing archival material; conducting indepth research; and/or lending a hand in the area of public information service.
