Hello everyone out there in *numismaland*. Ok, so I take a few liberties with the English language, but, we do have a specialized hobby that demands a specialized vocabulary!

I always wonder what to talk about in this communication. First this has been an interesting year to say the least. Everyone in the Pacific Northwest was involved in the National Money ShowTM held last March in Portland. I for one had a great time in the doing and in visiting old friends and meeting new ones. Our connection with the ANA has never been better or more important, more about that later.

Secondly, American numismatics in general seems to be doing quite well. I say seems as there is a little Federal legislation that has been passed that could change that in a way we would never have thought possible. That legislation is called: **Emergency Protection for Iraqi Antiquities Act.** It was instigated and supported by the following archaeological organizations including:

- The Archaeological Institute of America
- The American Academic Research Institute in Iraq (TAARII) (formerly American Association for Research in Baghdad),
- The American Schools of Oriental Research
- The Society for American Archaeology
- The American Anthropological Association
- The College Art Association

While this all seems innocent enough the opposite is true. It was designed to address the looting of Iraqi museums immediately following the "end of hostilities" in Iraq. As we now know, in fact most of the items that were taken were recovered or not even stolen but hidden away for protection.

The archaeological community in fact was using this as a pretext to initiate an out and out ban on anyone who has a cultural item over 100 years old in their possession. They say they are the only ones qualified to handle and

study such items and you as a collector are not.

What you say, "I only collect US coins and tokens, and this only affects ancient coins." The grim truth is that they want to ban <u>all</u> collecting of cultural items over 100 years old. If you collect US Coins, Hard Times or Civil War tokens, currency, artifacts (Civil War bullets, etc.) you can be affected. In fact they went after a major auction in London and forced the withdrawal of a stamp collection with items over 100 years old. At this point it is too late to stop it as the legislation was signed by President Bush, interestingly enough on *December 7*, 2004.

There is a grass roots organization formed specifically to fight further inroads into our freedom to collect coins. That group is called The Ancient Coin Collectors Guild. The ACCG is for ALL collectors of numismatic history. It doesn't matter what you collect you can and will be affected by this type of legislation unless we support their efforts. I urge all members of the PNNA to support the ACCG. I urge you to take a look at the ACCG (the URL is http://accg.us/) and give them your support. We don't need another *Pearl Harbor* style attack by the archeological community to wake us up. The first shot has been fired and the fleet is in big trouble.

Getting back to the ANA; **POVA** or the Portland Oregon Visitors Association has requested that the ANA consider returning to Portland, Oregon in 2009 or 2010. A joint task force has been formed by the PNNA and the Willamette Coin Club to pursue a bid for that contingency.

This would be a partnership by both organizations to bring the ANA back to the Pacific Northwest as soon as we can. Portland is a great venue and fits within the financial guidelines of the ANA from the standpoint of the cost of the facilities. Seattle has been and continues to be too expensive a venue for the ANA. I will keep everyone informed on the progress of this venture as we have the resources and talent to put on another great ANA event.

I guess that about sums it up from me for now. I would like to take this opportunity to wish all of you the best Holiday Season and a fantastic 2005. See you at the 2005 PNNA Convention!

Exhibits at the ANA 2005 Spring Convention

The ANA early spring convention (National Money ShowTM) in 2005 will be in Kansas City. The dates are 8-10 April (Friday-Sunday). If you are interested in exhibiting there, write to ANA headquarters (attention Barbara Olson) and request the exhibit rules and application. The case limit for spring shows is completely different from summer shows (normally up to fifteen cases if you show only one exhibit, but due to space restrictions, the case limit is nine cases for Kansas City), which provides an opportunity to show the large exhibit you have always had in the back of your mind. APPLICATION DEADLINE IS 14 MARCH.

Exhibits at the 2005 ANA Anniversary Convention

If you want to exhibit at the ANA anniversary convention (World's Fair of Money®) in San Jose in July, ask ANA for an exhibit application now (see the information above about how to apply). THE APPLICATION DEADLINE IS 31 MAY 2005.

Exhibits at the 2005 PNNA Convention

Exhibits must be in place by noon on Saturday 30 April to be eligible for awards, which will be announced at 4:00 PM. We would prefer to have your exhibits in place on Friday, so that visitors to the convention can view and learn from them. If you want to use PNNA cases, you must send an application to Larry Rowe by 18 April so that those cases can be available.

Use the form enclosed to apply for exhibit space and exhibit cases (send to Larry Rowe, PO Box 61621, Vancouver, WA 98666; phone 360-573-9827; email medalman@pacifier.com). Remember that the PNNA best of show winner receives \$200 in assistance to take the winning exhibit to the ANA anniversary convention in the same year.

The complete exhibit application is four pages long, just like ANA's. Pages 2-4 are only needed if you intend to have someone else place or remove your exhibit or if you are a multiple winner of first place awards at previous PNNA conventions. If you think you need the last three pages (not included here to save postage), ask for a complete copy of the rules from the secretary at the address in the letterhead. There are several references to specific parts of the rules in the PNNA application; if you have a copy of the ANA rules, you can determine what those references are without having the PNNA rules in hand.

The striking of ancient coins

Most of us who collect modern coins have an understanding of the modern minting process. Additionally, some of us may also be knowledgeable regarding the work of the coin die engraver. For instance, most of us know that modern coin blanks are punched out from sheets of metal that were produced at a mill. We also know that the dies are cut by machinery using digital technology. Things were quite different in ancient times.

In ancient times none of the techniques or technology existed that would or could be used to produce the exquisite results that they nevertheless achieved. How did they do it?

Beginning with the flan or planchet, we know that they were manufactured by a casting process. Molten metal was poured into a mold and then broken out after cooling. This process didn't always produce flans of equal size and weight. That is just one of he reasons why any two ancient coins of the same issue are never exactly alike. The coin dies were cut by hand individually. A bow drill was most likely used to produce a reverse image on a bronze die that was work-hardened. Remember that the die engraver didn't have the benefit of strong acids, high magnification or even an adequate source of available light. The actual process of striking the coin is illustrated on this Roman Republican Silver Denarius of the mint official T. CARISIVS, a senator responsible for the operation of the mint in 46 BC when this coin was struck. The aforementioned flan was heated in an annealing oven and when the desired temperature was reached the flan was removed from the oven (with the tongs shown) and placed on the anvil holding the reverse die. The obverse die (shown above the anvil) was struck with the hammer (shown to the right of the anvil). The obverse die is in the shape of the cap warn by Vulcan, the Roman god of the forge.

The coin features the bust of Juno Moneta (from where we get the word money). The Mint of Rome was located adjacent to the temple of Juno Moneta on the Arx summit of the Capitoline Hill.

American Numismatic Association News

ANA Selects Bowers and Merena For Official Auctions in 2005 and 2006 (Colorado Springs, Colorado & Irvine, California) — Bowers and Merena Auctions will be the official auctioneer for two upcoming American Numismatic Association conventions.

Selected earlier this year as the official auctioneer for the ANA National Money ShowTM in Kansas City, Missouri, April 8-10, 2005, the firm was also chosen by the ANA Board of Governors to handle the auction for the organization's World's Fair of Money® in Denver, August 16-20, 2006.

"ANA auctions have been eagerly supported by collectors and dealers over the years," said Christopher Cipoletti, ANA Executive Director. "With the help of auction companies like Bowers and Merena, we not only provide a marketplace service to buyers and sellers, but generate important funding to promote the hobby through educational outreach programs as well."

According to president, Steve Deeds, his firm realized nearly \$12.8 million from nearly 5,300 lots during the 2003 ANA sale in Baltimore.

"Over the years, Bowers and Merena — a Spectrum Numismatics subsidiary of Greg Manning Auctions, Inc. — has handled hundreds of millions of dollars worth of coins for tens of thousands of consignors, including libraries, historical societies and government agencies, as well as consignments from individuals and estates." Deeds said.

"We will be actively seeking great coins for these auctions, beginning with the Kansas City sale," he said. "We're looking for choice, rare and interesting United States coins in all series, from colonials to silver dollars and double eagles, certified or uncertified. We offer immediate cash payments or advances on auction consignments."

DONOR PURCHASES JOHN FORD MATERIALS FOR ANA LIBRARY — His name – already synonymous with numismatic literature, research and education – is well-known throughout the American Numismatic Association and the numismatic community.

Dwight N. Manley, California-based sports agent, collector and numismatic hobby promoter, contributed \$250,000 to the organization's expanded Library in October 2003 – the Library that now bears his name.

On June 1, 2004, that legacy was extended through the purchase and donation of nearly \$30,000 in numismatic literature from the John Ford sale for the ANA Library's permanent Rarities Collection.

ANA Executive Director, Chris Cipoletti sees the donation as further evidence of Manley's intense dedication to the numismatic hobby. "We are fortunate and proud to have earned the respect and confidence of Dwight and Sahar

Manley. Their notable, significant gifts to the Library have strengthened the Association. They are true representatives of the spirit of the ANA in its mission to educate and encourage the study and collection of money and related items."

Acquired with the help of ANA Governor Don Kagin who attended the June 1 John Ford Numismatic Auction on the Association's behalf, more than 24 lots were added to the library's collection at Manley's direction.

"It was a great opportunity," Kagin said. "At Dwight's request, we worked with librarian Nancy Green to develop a prioritized wish list of A, B and C materials – and were able to fill some existing holes in the collection."

Materials purchased included a number of sought-after 19th century auction catalogs. These publications often feature the handwritten names of purchasers and prices paid in the margins.

"Collectors like to know the provenance of their most valuable coins. These catalog listings often include notes on the names of purchasers," Green said, adding that many auction publications provide a wealth of research data.

In addition, the Library acquired a copy of one of the top works on Early American Cents, annotated by noted numismatist, Walter Breen.

"All the materials will be used for numismatic research by collectors at our facility," said Green, noting that all materials purchased at the Ford Auction will become a part of the ANA Library's collection - and may only be reviewed on the premises.

George Kolbe, compiler of the John Ford auction catalog, conducted the sale in conjunction with Stack's, generating more than \$1 million in numismatic literature sales.

"When we were recognizing their generous donation to the Library last October, I mentioned to Dwight and Sahar about some of the wonderful materials coming up for bid from the John Ford Collection. They agreed that it was a great opportunity to acquire books out of circulation for 40 years," said Kagin.

Manley, who admits he bought the first and finest set of original *The Numismatist* magazines, also offered at the Ford Collection auction, finds his contributions to the ANA's Library personally satisfying.

"I think anything I give to the ANA is a great investment," he said. "The Library is important to me. I used it as a young numismatist during Summer Seminar and got lots of enjoyment out of learning there. I believe it should be a world-class resource to the members, and hope this is one step toward achieving that goal."
