PNNA Board Casts Its ANA Ballot

This year, there are 16 candidates running for 7 American Numismatic Association (ANA) Board of Governor positions (not including President and Vice President, who are running unopposed). If you have been reading the numismatic press, you know that this is the most contested election in recent ANA history. A number of important issues have been raised by the “reform” candidates, including:

- Secrecy and confidentiality — currently board members are required to sign a confidentiality agreement, and some board deliberations and votes are conducted in secret rather than in open forum.
- Budget — currently the ANA budget is only “balanced” by drawing from endowment income, while the ANA is trying to raise \$40 million for new museums.
- Staff — many former ANA staff members have been “let go” in just the past couple of years.
- Bylaws — the ANA has recommended that the Board adopt a total rewrite of the ANA Bylaws, including the manner in which Board of Governor candidates would be selected in the future.

As an ANA member club, the PNNA has one vote in the ANA election. The PNNA Board has collaborated and decided to cast its ballot for the following candidates:

Joseph E. Boling
Walter A. Ostromecki
Clifford Mishler
Chester L. Krause
Anthony Tumonis
Edward C. Rochette
John R. Eshbach

Of course most of you will recognize Joe Boling as our longtime former secretary / treasurer / exhibit chief judge, who is also an internationally-recognized expert in several fields of numismatics. Walt Ostromecki, who just received the PNNA’s Everett Award, was elected to the ANA Board two years ago, but was then unfairly removed, in the opinion of many PNNA members.

Some of the other candidates are also big names — Mishler and Krause of Krause Publications fame, and Ed Rochette, in whose honor the ANA Money Museum is named. Tumonis is less well-known, but is a former ANA Regional Coordinator who has been very supportive of local clubs and the PNNA. Eshbach, along with Boling, is well-known to numismatic exhibitors at the national level. All of these are among the “reform” candidates.

Whatever you do, if you are an ANA member, please vote in this election! The official ballot must be returned by July 19, 2007. There is a line on the ballot for your ANA member number for verification purposes — please copy this number accurately from the envelope in which you received your ballot, as the formats of some member numbers have changed. Return the ballot to the accounting firm in the envelope provided, and any comments on the Bylaws to the ANA using the separate comment form enclosed.

Call for Puyallup Fair Volunteers

PNNA 2006 National Coin Week Contest by Larry Rowe, Judge

Several years ago, PNNA established an annual competition of displays or promotions by member clubs to celebrate National Coin Week. Cash prizes are awarded for the top three entries. Like convention exhibiting, the NCW program has declined until there was only one entry this year. Are the prizes too small to bother? Is there no interest in this promotion? Your comments would be appreciated.

This year’s winner takes the top award based on their promotion of NCW, not because they are the only entry, but because they had an outstanding program. The theme for the 2007 NCW was “The Presidents Are Coming.” This year’s winner is the Olympia Coin Club of Olympia, Washington, and they will receive a check for \$100.00 for their club treasury. They placed a display in the Tumwater branch of the Timberland Regional Library. The attractive display consisted of three trays of presidential coins and medals. There were presidents on current coins, foreign coins, and medals and tokens. The Olympia club also arranged for five AM and FM local radio stations to make public service announcements about NCW. They provided the stations with trivia questions and prizes to award the

winner. The club president, Dick Cowley, also had on air interviews on two stations. The PNNA commends The Olympia Coin Club for their excellent promotion of National Coin Week.

Washington Quarter Launch Ceremony

The Washington State Quarter was officially launched at a ceremony with Governor Chris Gregoire at Seattle Center on April 11. The quarters then began slowly appearing in circulation, but they probably didn’t last long at your local bank! U.S. Mint Director Edmund C. PNNA SHOW DRAWS OVER 2,000*by Walt Ostromecki*

The 58th Annual Convention and Coin Show of the Pacific Northwest Numismatic Association was held on April 13-15 at the Tukwila Community Center nearby SeaTac International Airport, WA.

General Chairman Richard Bilings noted that Friday attendance exceeded 600, with total attendance pushing the 2,500 mark. Every youth who registered for the show and Treasure Hunt received a Washington State Quarter affixed in a 2 x 2 to a special Souvenir Card designed by member Walt Ostromecki. The Washington State Quarter was released in a Seattle, WA ceremony on April 11th.

Youth activities and youth convention educational-informational programs were under the direction of PNNA member Walt Ostromecki. Youth and their families were treated to a number of numismatic goodies and state quarter boards courtesy of the U.S. Mint's H.I.P. Program. 78 youth completed the Money Scavenger Hunt. Each took home an array of coins and currency including: Buffalo nickel, Indian cent, new Washington golden dollar, Notgeld, 1943 Steel cent, Kenya 10-cent copper, Washington State "P" Quarter, 2005 Westward Journey Bison nickel, silver War nickel and Mercury dime. A special drawing for all youth who completed the Hunt was held on Sunday afternoon. Up for grabs were seven silver and one gold coin prizes donated by the PNNA and dealers. The one-tenth ounce American Eagle gold bullion piece was won by Bryan Wesho, 10, of Vancouver, WA.

Dealers reported brisk retail sales all three days. PNNA President Larry Gaye, said: "Several dealers came up to me on Saturday afternoon to report they had two real happy days of excellent sales." Bill McKivor, The Copper Corner, commented: "sales of one of a kind type coins slabbed and raw were selling like hot cakes. I just placed a nice clean circulated example of an 1877 Indian Cent in my case and it sold immediately." Dennis Reed, Lacey Rare Coins said: "I didn't even have an opportunity to actually sit behind my table until late Saturday afternoon. Sales were that brisk!" David Floyd from Coeur d'Alene Idaho remarked: "Type and collectors coins were selling so fast that my show stock was rapidly depleting. I even considered a drive back to my store in Idaho on Saturday night just to replenish all the empty holes in my collector coin books."

Exhibit Chairman Larry Rowe announced that exhibits (invitational and non) were diverse. The one attracting the most attention was "Selections of Washington State National Banknotes." Others deemed worthy of merit included: "A Timeline History of the Quarter

Dollar;" "History of the Penny;" "Tonga-The Friendly Islands;" and "Ten Shilling Irish: 1928-1968."

The PNNA held its annual meeting on Saturday. President Larry Gaye presented the first PNNA PRESIDENTIAL AWARD for meritorious services to numismatics in the Pacific Northwest to Rick Shultz, long time dedicated editor of the Tacoma-Lakewood Coin Club newsletter. The Nina Nystrom Memorial Goodwill Ambassador Award was presented to long time member, past president and PNNA promoter, Tom Sheehan.

The association's highest honor, The Bob Everett Memorial Award for integrity and demonstrated commitment to numismatics in the Pacific NW, went to Walt Ostromecki. Mr. Gaye noted in his presentation remarks: "Walter has helped to rejuvenate our convention's youth activities and programs for the past six years. He is passionate in his approach to not only educate youngsters and families alike, but make their experience with numismatics fun and memorable. He is a high energy volunteer; a giver and doer for the hobby because he loves it!"

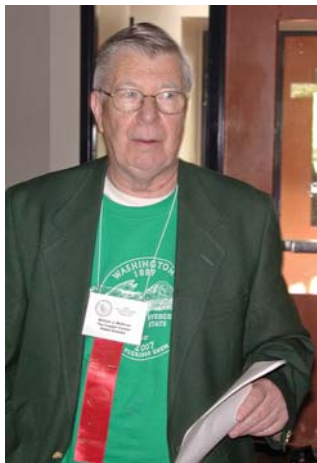
President Gaye also expressed his sincere thanks to members of the South King County Coin Club for their assistance with set-up, tear-down, registration and hospitality. He also thanked Ben Franklin – yes that famed Philadelphia Statesman was in attendance – for discussing the Colonial Revolutionary War period with collectors and guests alike, courtesy of Colonial Coin Collector's Club. Additionally, he extended kudos to Bill McKivor for his enlightening educational talk: "Steam Powered Minting 1789."

The PNNA once again offered custom designed and struck "tokens" for its 2007 convention. This year the design (on one side) was a Gallery Mint replica of the U.S. 1792 half disme. These were struck on an early hand operated screw press by Greg Franck-Weiby. A four token set (gold, silver, copper and pewter) sold for \$100; the three token (no gold) for \$15 and individual pewter pieces at \$1. A few individual pieces may still remain. ANA's New Exhibit, “Coins, Crown and Conflict”

As a brilliant general, political revolutionary and Lord Protector of England, Oliver Cromwell lived by the motto, “Let peace be sought through war.” Almost 350 years after his death, Cromwell is remembered by some as a great leader and hero for freedom, and by others as a vengeful dictator and hypocrite.

“Coins, Crown and Conflict: An Exploration of Cromwell's England,” a new exhibit opening June 7 at the American Numismatic Association's Edward C. Rochette Money Museum, chronicles the era of Oliver Cromwell – one of the most important and turbulent periods in British history.

During the English Civil War (1642-1651), the struggle between Parliament and the Monarchy affected English life down to the money people carried. Coins made during the rule of Charles I, Oliver Cromwell and Charles II document a time of bloody battles, executions, struggles for increased liberties and a transformation in how England was governed.

One of the exhibit's extremely rare and valuable coins is The Petition Crown, produced by Thomas Simon, the chief engraver at the Royal Mint during Cromwell's rule. Created in 1663 to convince Charles II to change his mind about the selection of a Dutch minter's coin design, Simon engraved his petition to the king around the coin's rim. It read: ‘THOMAS SIMON MOST HVMBLY PRAYS YOVR MAJESTY TO COMPARE THIS HIS TRYALL PIECE WITH THE DVTCH AND IF MORE TRVLY DRAWN & EMBOSS'D MORE GRACE; FVLLY ORDER'D AND MORE ACCURATELY ENGRAVEN TO RELIEVE HIM.’ The silver coin features an image of Charles II so detailed it shows the King's neck veins in candlelight shadows. But the coin came too late for Charles II to change his plans.

There are very few remaining Petition Crowns. The finest, from the collection of Geoffrey Cope, is part of the ANA's exhibit and marks the first time in many years a Petition Crown has been exhibited in the United States.

“Pieces during these turbulent times comprise the most interesting and exciting of all British issues,” Cope said.

Cope also lent the ANA several artifacts pertaining to Oliver Cromwell for the exhibit, including his death mask, his spectacles and a penny Bible.

The exhibit runs through November 2008.

Brunner Leaves ANA to Found Pharmacy School at Regis University

Lane Brunner, deputy executive director of museum, library and research services at the American Numismatic Association, left June 15 to become the founding dean of the Regis University School of Pharmacy.

An accomplished numismatist who came to the ANA in 2004 from The University of Texas at Austin's College of Pharmacy faculty, Brunner was instrumental in expanding the Association's educational offerings and in its plans to add museums in San Francisco and Washington, D.C.

“Lane was very easy to work with. He was willing to take on any project or initiative,” ANA Executive Director Chris Cipoletti said. “He is a very knowledgeable numismatist with an ability to be forward-thinking to make sure that the ANA has a future for generations to come.”

Brunner will start June 18 at Regis, working to found a School of Pharmacy that is set open in fall 2008.

“It was an incredible opportunity I just had to pursue. Regis University has an excellent reputation for education and training, especially in the healthcare professions,” Brunner said. “I will miss working with the ANA's fantastic staff – an amazing group of people.”

Deputy Executive Director for Education and Publications Sharon Thomas will take over operational responsibility for the ANA's museum and library. Cipoletti will oversee the facilities management of the San Francisco and Washington, D.C., museums.

During this time, the ANA will consider allocating resources to bringing in additional staff to support the museum and library's educational mission. A final decision will be made within the next two months.
